Guidance for Absence and Lateness

Dear Parent/Carer

Firstly, may we thank Parents and Carers who regularly ensure that their children attend school at all times. There is a strong correlation between high attendance and high achievement and so we should all be working together to give children the best possible start in life.

The attached letter outlines Hampshire County Council's statutory 'Code of Conduct February 2019' to promote your child's good attendance at school.

Overview

- All schools aim to achieve a goal of 100% attendance.
- The 'persistent absence' threshold is any attendance that is below 90%, (equivalent to three weeks or more schooling across the year).
- A Penalty Notice will be issued for any unauthorised absence where the pupil has been:
 - o absent for 10 or more half-day sessions (five school days) of unauthorised absence during any 100 possible school sessions these do not need to be consecutive
 - o persistently late for up to 10 sessions (five days) after the register has closed
 - persistently late before the close of the register, but the school has met with the Parent or Carer and has clearly communicated that they will categorise as unauthorised any further lateness if, and when, the threshold of 10 sessions (five days) has been met
 - o absent for any public examinations, formal school assessments, tests or examinations of which dates are published in advance

Penalty notices will be issued if a child's attendance crosses any of the above thresholds. If a fine is raised, then <u>each responsible parent</u> will be fined <u>£60 per child</u>. Failure to pay within a set period of time will incur further penalties.

Headteachers have the authority to grant leave of absence but <u>only</u> in exceptional cases. Please note, children already have 13 weeks of holiday throughout the year.

From February 2019 The Hampshire Code of Conduct states that if a Penalty Notice has previously been issued and this has been ineffective in addressing the absenteeism, the case must be referred to the Attendance Legal Panel (ALP) who will then decide whether to issue a subsequent Penalty Notice or recommend alternative intervention which may include parental prosecution.

Research shows that absence from school, for whatever reason, can disadvantage a child by creating gaps in learning, which affect a child's ability to succeed. As such, we monitor all absence thoroughly and all attendance data is shared with the Local Authority. We will contact you if we have any concerns regarding your child's attendance. If your child's attendance level is falling towards 90%, then we will contact you to raise our concern. All Schools within our Cluster are committed to working together to support the improvement of children's attendance and punctuality to school. Please support us by giving your child the best opportunities through good attendance at school.
